114 grieving families, including **32 children** who lost one or both parents

590 volunteers, including **150 local volunteers**, participated in the response

Support for schools

In the last three years, the Red Cross has contributed to 12 education projects. "These projects are restoring balance to elementary schools and the local high school," said Isabelle Dagneau, Director of Complementary Education and Special Education Services at the Hauts-Cantons School Board. "Yes, things are certainly going better, but it's still tough for many people. Some students will never be able to make up for what they lost. However, the assistance helped us get back on track and provide greater support to many students."

A cross-generational fitness circuit

The outdoor fitness circuit, which opened in spring 2016 near the Mégantic Sports Centre, gives everyone the opportunity to work out, have fun, and enjoy the natural beauty of Chaudière River Park. The Red Cross contributed to the project, which will provide long-term support to the community and therefore aligns perfectly with the recovery and reconstruction component of its assistance program.

A community health project




In collaboration with the Le Granit healthcare and social services centre, the Red Cross developed a community health project in Lac-Mégantic for seniors, adults with a loss of independence, and their caregivers. The project is based on the existing Red Cross Arts and Crafts program.


The Arts and Crafts program was created after the Second World War to promote veterans' independence and self-esteem using craft projects. The program then grew to include workshops for seniors, adults with a loss of independence, and their caregivers. It helps break down barriers of isolation and loneliness by encouraging social interaction. Through crafting, the program aims to help develop or maintain fine motor skills and cognitive abilities.
